Subflance of LORD CAMDEN's Speech in Parliament, Nov. 15, 1775.



HILE I am up, my Lords, you will give me leave to fay a few words to the general question. The noble Earl, so lately one of his Majesty's Secretaries of State, has informed us that we are in a state of war, that secrety is of course necessary. I deny that we are. Peace is still within our power; nay, we may command it. A fuspention of arms on our part, if adopted in time, will secure it for us, and, I may

add, on our own terms. From which it is plain, as we have been the original and earn in this business, if we obstinging, areast, we are fairly answerabie for all the consequences. I again repeat, what I often urged before, that I was against this unnatural war from the beginning. I was equally against every measure from the instant the first tax was proposed to this minute. When, therefore, it is infifted that we aim only to defend and enforce our own rights, I politively deny it. I contend, that America has been driven, by cruel necessity, to defend her rights from the united attacks of VIOLENCE, OPPRESSION, and INJUSTICE. I contend, that America has been indisputably aggrieved. Perhaps, as a domineering Englishman, wishing to enjoy the ideal benefit of such a claim, I might urge it with earnestness, and endeavour to carry my point; but if, on the other hand, I refided in America, that I felt, or was to feel, the effects of such manifest injustice, I certainly should reful the attempt with that degree of ardour so daring a violation of what should be held dearer than life itself ought to enkindle in the breast of every freeman. Here, my Lords I speak as an American, or as one residing in America, who finding himfelf deprived of his liberty, and his property attacked, would refult, and with all his might repel the aggressor. On the other hand, as living in this country, and subject to the laws of it, I always have, and I hope always shall, pay a proper obedience to them. But, my Lords, purfuing the ideas of a native American, or a person refiding in that country, what must be the sense they feel of the repeated injuries that have for a succession of years past been heaped on them? ---To have their property, under the idea of afferting a right to tax them, voted away by one act of Parliament, and their charters, under an idea of the supreme authority of the British legislature, swept away by another vote of Parliament. Thus depriving them, or rather claiming a right to dispose of every fingle shilling they are worth, without one of them being represented by the persons pretending to exercise this right; and thus stripping them of their natural rights, growing out of the constitution, confirmed by charter, and recognized by every branch of the legiflature, without examination, or even without hearing. I will fairly appeal to your Lordships, if there be one among you, could submit to fuch intolerable oppressions; nay further, if you would not all unite as one man, were you in such a situation, to oppose the execution of so lawless and unjust a power. I do not mean, my Lords, to go through the whole of this business. I reserve that for some future day: I dare fay I shall have many opportunities, and I pledge myself to your Lordthips, on that day, that I will prove Great Britain has been the aggressor; that America has only acted on the defensive, and that were I an American, and wanted a proper sense of the injuries attempted to be exercised towards me, that I should only think them justifiable, so far as I wanted spirit to refift, and was conscious to myself, that I was undeserving the enjoyment of any privilege, that I was mean, cowardly, or abject enough to tamely relinquish.

BOSTON, Augult 29.

AST Saturday afternoon was chased into Marblehead by the Mil-AST Saturday afternoon was challed into Jondon, ford frigate, the prize ship Haac, from Tortola bound to London, ford frigate, the prize ship Haac, from Tortola bound to London, three hundred and fifty tons burthen, commanded by Captain Ashburn, laden with five hundred hogsheads of sugar, forty four puncheons of rum, one hundred and fifty bags of cotton, a confiderable quantity of old copper, and a number of turtle. She was taken by the privateer floop Warren, commanded by Captain Phillips, and had it not been for the fort at Marblehead, which fired at the Milford feveral times, she would have been inevitably retaken.

And on Sunday the above frigate took off Cape Ann, a prize brigantine coming into port, faid to be one of Captain White's of Salem, laden

with rum from Grenada. Also a large floop, which our informant could not tell where from, or who commanded her.

Yesterday the Honourable Samuel Adams, one of the Delegates from

this state, arrived in town from Philadelphia.

The privateer floop Broome, Capt. William Nott commander, belonging to New Heaven, arrived at Dartmouth on Monday laft from a cruife, and has taken the four following valuable prizes, viz. On the 3d of August last, in lat. 32. 25. and long. 59. 46. the ship Charming Sally, John Stell commander, bound to Europe from Dominica. She had on board four hundred and fixty five hogsheads of fugar, thuty one tierces ditto, thirty five barrels ditto, and twenty five tons of fuffick. On the ath of August, in lat. 32. 25. and long. 59. 46. the snow Anne, John Bowes Captain, from Tobago, bound to Lancaster, and had on board one hundred and fixty nine hogsheads of sugar, twenty tierces ditto, twenty fix barrels ditto, forty bags of ginger, and one hundred and eighteen bales of cotton. On the 5th of August, in lat. 33. 37. and long. 60. 16. the brig Carolina Packet, Mark Towell Captain, bound from Antigua to London, had on board one hundred and fifty one hogfheads of fugar, twelve tierces ditto, ten barrels ditto, two hogsheads of rum, and fourteen tons of lignum vitæ and fustick. On the 7th of August, in lat. 34. 95. and long. 60. 18. the brig John, Capt. Daniel M'Kay, bound from Grenada to Dublin, had on board ninety hogsheads and two tierces of rum.

WATERTOWN, August 26. Last Wednesday arrived at Ports-mouth, a prize ship of about 200 tons burthen, mounting 20 guns, 12 of which were wood. She was bound from the Bay of Honduras for London, laden with mohogany and logwood, and taken by the Hancock

and Franklin privateers.

By the eastern post we are informed, that on Monday last arrived at Portfmouth, New Hampshire, a vessel from Holland, with dry goods, drugs, spices, &c.

The post from No. Four, informs us of a gondola, with about 25

men, being taken by the enemy in Lake Champlain.

NEWPORT, Aug. 22. By a Gentleman from Dartmouth we are affured, that a privateer belonging to Fair Haven had taken a very large Jamaica ship, with seven hundred hogsheads of sugar, two hundred hogsheads of rum, and a large quantity of cotton; this ship was so valuable, that the Captain of the privateer, who was the best pilot for the eaftern shore of any on board, went on board the ship to carry her in, and was parted with by the privateer last Sunday week. The privateer is arrived with more prifoners than men belonging to her.

NEW HAVEN, Aug. 28. Last Monday passed our harbour, standing to the westward, two frigates, the Niger of 32 guns, Capt. Talbot, the other is faid to carry 28 guns, also a large brig of 16 or 18 guns, who had in company two small vessels supposed to be prizes. They left the English fleet, near New York, last Friday sevennight, and it is probable will remain in the Sound, to interrupt our communication with the

army at New York.

PHILADELPHIA, September 10.

WE hear from New York, that a few days ago a man of war of forty guns came to anchor in Turtle Bay, upon which General Washington ordered two 12 pounders to be carried to a convenient piece of ground to attack her. They foon obliged the ship to retire, having hulled her twelve times.

On the 12th ult. the continental floop of war Sachem, Capt. Robinson, of eight guns, fell in with, and after a short engagement took, the brig Three Friends, Andrew Stalker mafter, mounting fix carriage guns, bound from Antigua to Halifax, laden with rum, fugar, &c. which

arrived fafe in this port on Sunday laft.

We hear that in the rate action on Long Island Col. PHILLIP JOHN-STON, of New Jersey, behaved with remarkable intrepidity and fortitude. By the well directed fire from his battalion the enemy were feveral times repulfed and lanes were made through them; until he seeived a ball in his breaft, which put an end to the life of as brave an officer as ever commanded a battalion. General Sullivan, who was close to him when he fell, fays that no man could behave with more firmness during the whole action. As he facrificed his life in defence of the invaded rights and liberties of his country, his memory must be dear to every American who is not infenfible to the fufferings of his injured country, and as long as the fame uncorrupted spirit of liberty, which led him to the field, shall continue to actuate the sons of freedom in America.

Sept. 8. Yesterday the Hon. BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, JOHN ADAMS, and EDWARD RUTLEDGE, Esquires, members of the Hon. Congress, set off for New York, in order, it is said, to confer with Lord Howe, upon the subject of fundry propositions sent by his Lordship to the Congress by General Sullivan.

Monday last arrived here General Sullivan, who was taken in the late action on Long Island. He is permitted to come here by General Howe, tofettle an exchange of prisoners.

## WILLIAMSBURG, Sept. 7.

AST Thursday Captain Theodorick Bland's troop of light-horse arrived in town, from Petersburg. And yesterday arrived from Gloucester the 7th regiment of foot (late Daingerfield's) now Crawford's, in place of the 5th, who (as well as the 4th and 6th) are under orders to proceed to New York.

A finall veffel is arrived at Burwell's ferry, from Cape Nichola Mole, with a quantity of falt, and fundry other very ufeful articles. She brings advice of an infurrection of the negroes in Jamaica, on account of the ferreity of provisions; that between 60 and 70 white people had been killed, numbers of the negroes taken and punished, and martial law proclaimed throughout the island. Another vessel is arrived at Hampten with 1200 buinels of falt.

A final! privateer, fitted out at Baltimore, is lately returned from a coule, having taken and ordered into port two large Jamaica ships,
