I IIS excellency general Wathington has lately received a letter from the lord Cornwallis, enclosing a most audacious and impertinent paper from a certain heut. col. Walcott, acting under general Howe's authority, wherein he demands, in very high and peremptory terms, the full and due performance of the agreement entered into the 30th of July and 1st of August for an exchange of prisoners, and the return and releasment of an equal number for those feat and delivered over to general Washington; and is pleased to term lieut, coi. Harrison's objections thereto, on the part of his excellency, groundless and suprecedented, and that they cannot, with any degree of reason, or consistently with common sense, be allowed or admitted as obliacles .- General Washington, to general Howe, replies: That it is with peculiar regret he is contrained to observe (upon this illiberal performance of lient. col. Walcott's, a copy of which he transmitted to him) that it is calculated to answer a less generous purpose than that of merely effecting an exchange of prifoners, contains a gross mifreprefentation of facts, and is a palde deviation from that delicate line which he expected would mark his conduct as a man of candour and ingey; for that he has mutilated and miffated matters, in fuch a manner us to change their meaning, and to adopt them to the unfair conclusions he withed to establish. explains the motives of his conduct, and the grounds on which the fald mr. Walcott's charge is founded: That he does not hold himfelf bound; either in the spirit of the agreement or by the principles of justice, to secount for those philoners who, from the rigour and feverity of their treatment, were in to emaciated and languilding a flate, at the time they came out, as to render their death almost certain and inevitable, and which, in finder intrances, happened while they were returning to their homes, and in many others after their arrival; that the object of every cartel, or fimilar agreement, is the soft of the priloners themselves, and that of the couconding powers, on which footing it equally exacts that they should be well treated as that they should be exthanged; that the reverse is therefore an evident infractiout, and ought to subject the party on whom it is chargeable to all the damage and ili confequences refulting from it; that it cannot be expected those unfitted for future ferrice, by acts of feverity, in direct violation of a compact, are proper subjects for an exchange, and that to are otherenot in the same predicament would be to give without receiving an equivalent, and would afford the greatest encouragement to cruelty and inhumanity; that prifoners having been received is of no validity, for that, thought from their wretched fituation, they could not at that time be deemed proper for an exchange, our humanity required that they should be permitted to return smongst us, although it is confessed that after their delivery they still continued prilopers, and would be fo till regularly exchanged; that it may, perhaps, be fairly doubted, whether an apprehension of their death, or that of a great part of them, did not contribute to their being lent out when they were, and that it would have been happy if the expedient had been thought of before these ill fated men were reduced to fuch extremity .--- His excellency concludes as follows: " Thus, fir, baye I ex-" plained the motives of my conduct, and I trust vindi-" cated myfelf, in the eye of impartiality, from the Im-" proper and groundless charge which you, and the gentlemen acting by your authority, have been pleafed to alledge against me. If, in doing this, I have departed in the frasheit degree from that delicacy which I always wished should form a part of my character, you will remember I have been forced into recrimination, and that it has become an act of necef-" Ly juttice, I hall now declare it to be my ardent " wish, that a general exchange may take place on generous and liberal principles, as far as it can be effected,

and that the agreement subfilling between as for that purpose should be inviolably observed; and I call upon you, by every obligation of good faith, to remove all

" impediments on your part to the accomplishment of it. If, however, you do not, I confole myfelf with a hope that those unfortunate men whose lot it is to be your prisoners will bear their sufferings with becoming forti-

tude and magnanimity."

We are told, in a late London paper, that the loss which lord Dunmore suffained in his private property in Virginia exceeds 40 0001. whereas it is well known that his lordship had never half that worth of property in this country to lofe; and it is equally certain, that this doughty chief carried home with him more than double his fage. poled loss, which he amaffed from the capture of veffet, the plunder of our inhabitants, and from the fale of number of negroes he shipped off to the West Indies, whom he encouraged to leave their masters here upon

promise of freeing them from flavery.

The London papers, as late as January 23d, mention. that the French court, notwithstanding the spirited me morial of lord Weymouth, detaanding the restitution of an English ship (taken by the armed vessel which carried Dr. Franklin to France) have permitted the flip and cargo to be publickly fold at Nantz. That an express had at rived from Spain, with an account of the failing of a few cond ftrong fquadron from Cadiz. That in confequence of fresh advices of the deligns of France and Spain, the greatest warlike preparations were making in England and that the press for seamen had become botter then ever on the river Thames, &c. That four American privateers were, in January laft, lying in the harbour of Bourdeaux. That Portimouth rope house was supposed to be let on fire delignedly, and logol, reward is offered by government for the discovery of the offenders. That the inhabitants of Briftol have congratulated their kingen the fuccels of his arms against the Americans. That a number ber of thips, house, and stores, in that city, had been wilfully fet on fire, and guat damage done. That three troops of guards had arrived there to guard the city against incendiaries. That mr. Ebenezer Platt, a planter from Georgia, has been committed to Newgate for high treat ion, being accused of having made free with the kings flores at Savannah, and of hipplying his enemies with and munition. That instructions are lent to lord Stormont at the court of Verfailles, to demand the delivery of De Franklin, in order to be fent to Edgland; and in case of a retulal, that his lordship has orders to return home in mediately. That he had returned, without his prize and it was therefore supposed the French court had thrown off the mask.

Last Friday the first division of the North Carolina troops, under the command of col. Martin, passes through Petersburg, on their way to join the grand con tinental army. The other division was a few days march behind, compeling in the whole a body of 2000 well are

pointed men.

TYTHEREAS it appears to this Board, that many irregularities have been committed by the foldiers quartered in this city, and feveral other places, and great injuries have been done by them to the houses in which they have been barracked, and to the houses and enclofures near fuch barracks, &c.

and at every station within this commonwealth, be directed to give out, in general orders, that from and after the publication hereofall damages fullained by the proprietors of any houses, enclosures, &c. which shall be proved to be done by any officer or foldier, thall be made good by fuch officer or foldier, and thall be stopped out of his or their pay; and that the captain or commander of any company or detachment, on discovery that any house or enclosure where his company or detachment is barracked has been in any manner wantonly or carelessly injured, or that other damage has been done, shall forthwith cause fuch injury to be repaired, and shall pay for such repairs, or other damages, by stopping the pay of fuch foldier, or foldiers who committed the injury, and if the offence cannot be proved and fixed on any particular foldier, that then the expense of such repairs shall be stopped out of the pay of the whole company or detachment And if the officer commanding such company or detachment shall fail to make proper inquiry into and repair such damages, that then the commanding officer of the garrison or regiment shall order them to be made, and paid for out of the pay of fuch officer.

Resolved, that the like orders be given out to, and Brickly complied with, by all officers and foldiers on their different marches from place to place, and that full reparation be made for all damages done by them on such

marches.

Relatived, that the superiour officers at the stations of Partimouth and Hampton, be directed to make out exact returns of the troops of this commonwealth at each, and to transmit the same to this Board without delay.
