BY a gentleman from Charlestown in S. Carolina. we have the melancholy account that a most dreadful fire happened in that city the 15th of January. It broke out between 3 and 4 o'clock in the morning, in a baker's shop, upon the corner of Union street, adjoining Queen street, burnt from the Bay as high up in town as old Church street, and down the Bay as low as Scallers alley, not heaving above a dozen or f freen boufes standing in all that compals. It continued without intermission till sunset, and was at length got under by blowing up a number of houses, the fire engin s (of which there were about thirty) not proving fufficient to stop the rage of the flames. It was supp tid that between fix and leven hundred houf:s were burnt, which contained full three fourths of the trading part of the town, although only one life was loft, a woman who was a tenant in part of the baker's house. hin:felf has been fince taken up, on the oaths of f men, who heard him fay, the evening before the fa that before 12 o'clock next day one half the to I is, added to many oth Thould be lad in afh. circumstances. makes it believed that the city was, on fire by action, for which the baker was come to fuffer. The Governour and Council bed all the publick buildings to be opened for the reception of the unhappy fufferers, and that they fould be ferve ed with provisions as the military.
