## New Guide for Deaf and Hearing-Impaired

Handicap Awareness Week is October 9-16 and that makes this month particularly appropriate for telling visitors about a new publication, *Colonial Williamsburg: A Guide for Deaf and Hearing-Impaired Visitors*.

The booklet uses words that can be translated into sign language and provides an abundance of illustrations that help handicapped visitors identify

things they see in the Historic Area.

The publication is believed to be the first comprehensive guidebook for a major museum written especially for deaf and hearing-impaired visitors. The project was sponsored by the McDonald's Corporation in Oak Brook, Ill., and the Dietz Press in Richmond.

The guide was developed by Valerie Coons, staff assistant in interpretative education, while she was an Historic Sites Intern. She was assisted by Betty Wiggins, special assistant to the vice president, Division of Historic Area Programs and Operations, as well as by area professionals in rehabilitation and by deaf visitors who offered advice after using the proposed text.

The new handicapped guidebook is available free to deaf or hearing-impaired visitors with admission tickets. Other visitors can purchase a copy for \$1 at the Information Center.
